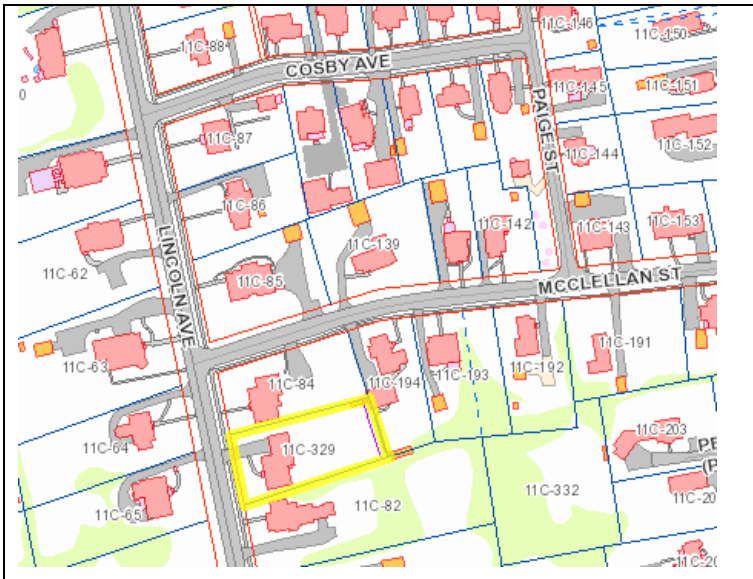

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

Standard one-and-a-half story cape from the 1950s. Centrally placed façade door with two double-hung windows, one flanking each side of the door. Home formerly had shutters around the windows, which have since been removed. Chimney is located on the far left of the building. Also on northern side of the building is an attached 16-ft, 16-panel garage door, a replacement from the original. The main feature of the house is the neo-classically inspired door frame, which features shallow pilasters supporting a shallow lintel; the door itself is deeply set within the frame. A second door is located between the garage and the house proper.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

Mary H. Taylor is listed as the first owner (owned from 1955 to 1992). She was the recent widow of Ernest C. Taylor (1921-1954), identified in City Directories as a "rubber worker." The couple had been living in South Amherst for a few years prior to his death.
